What is Tactical Urbanism?

ActivateYYC projects are based on tactical urbanism which is the concept of citizen-led, easy to implement urban interventions. The goal of tactical urbanism is to create small-scale improvements at the neighbourhood level.

These interventions are temporary and local with the goal to spark greater change on a larger scale. This approach allows many local actors to test new and creative approaches for improving cities before committing to long term, expensive projects. Tactical urbanism entails short-term commitments with realistic expectations and low-risk, fostering social connections among citizens.

Examples of successful tactical urbanism projects include:



Guerilla Gardening

Repurposing vacant land into small scale gardens. This movement has been widely successful in New York City.

Pavement to Parks

Reclaiming underutilized roads into public spaces using low cost items (such as movable chairs) to re-purpose the area. This has been successful in San Francisco with its Pavement to Parks program.


Furbaniture

Part 2

Engaging Evergreen



Engaging Evergreen

To come up with a unique and context specific tactical urbanism idea that can help activate Evergreen, we conducted a seven step process.

Step 1: Research the community

- Learned about Evergreen using numerous data sources
- Created a SWOT analysis (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats)

Step 2: Site visit

- Visited the community, taking note of assets and barriers
- Put ourselves in the shoes of all sorts of community members

Step 3: First community engagement session

- Discovered the board's most and least loved local areas through participatory mapping
- Discussed and learned where a good spot for community projects could be held
- Brainstormed potential tactical urbanism ideas

Step 4: Online survey

- Distributed a survey online to hear from the broader Evergreen community

Step 5: Idea Generation

- Analyzed our abundant feedback and determined 3 tactical urbanism projects
- The ideas were: an Evergreen Amazing Race, pallet benches with planters, and a winter wonderland festival

Step 6: Gaining community buy-in

- Presented the three ideas to the community and had them vote for their favourite. Evergreen Amazing Race was chosen.

Step 7: Report back

- This report explains what we did, what we learned and provides implementation guidance for the proposed tactical urbanism project!





Summary of What We Learned

From our seven-step process, that included community research, engagement sessions and an online survey, these are some key things we learned.



First Engagement Meeting

The key takeaway from the first meeting was that the community land by Marshall Springs school is considered an ideal community gathering spot. The board also suggested a few tactical urbanism ideas, such as community led walks, urban gardens and a race around the community paths.



Survey Results

What do people love most about living in Evergreen?

Proximity to Fish Creek, green spaces and/or pathway systems (46%), Peace and quiet, safe and/or clean (29%), Proximity to the schools (13%)

What are the biggest challenges that Evergreen faces?

Traffic, speeding or car dependency (53%), Lack of community amenities/facilities (36%)

What are your favourite places to go to within the community?

Fish Creek Park (49%), Paths (23%), Parks (16%), Playgrounds (24%)

Top three community activities that respondents enjoy participating in (that may or may not be in Evergreen):

Swimming at pools, lakes and beaches (16%), Community BBQs (11%), Skating (13%)

Top suggestions for tactical urbanism ideas?

Community garden (21%), Block Party (13%), Outdoor Games (13%)



Second Engagement Meeting

We proposed our three tactical urbanism project ideas, and the Evergreen Amazing Race was voted as the board's favourite idea. It was agreed that this idea will allow families and schools to get involved, utilize the assets of the parks and pathways, and provide a fun way to get residents moving around outside!






Evergreen Amazing Race



Evergreen Amazing Race – The Idea

- The Amazing Race is a one day event, showcasing various activities located around the community. With a series of clues and tasks, the race will take participants through the local path system and to various green spaces and playgrounds. Starting at the community land near Marshal Springs, participants will receive a clue for their first assigned station. Participants will be given different clues at the beginning of the race, so that teams are scattered among all stations (see suggested clues in the Appendix). Once the activity at each station is completed, participants will receive a clue for the next station! This race will be focussed on team building and participation as opposed to competition.
- Each participant will receive a race passport. On one side is the community map and on the reverse is a world map. The race will have seven stations with each station representing a continent. At every station, participants will receive a stamp on the world map. We chose to make each station a continent to add components of adventure and education. Activity ideas are based on materials from the Calgary Neighbourhoods Special Events Inventory (See Appendix for the entire list)
- At the end of the event, participants will meet back at the community land for the wrap-up party with refreshments and food, as well as group events that everyone can participate in. This will also allow for more community building, conversation, and activities. Participants will be eligible to enter a prize draw as well.

Evergreen Amazing Race - Logistics

- **Suggested date:** Saturday June 30th 2017
 - 1-4PM, race starts at 1:15PM
 - If more people than expected sign up for the race, stagger start times to avoid crowding at each station.
- **Location:** See the Appendix for the map. The station locations are contained which will help mitigate permit costs and be safer, as participants won't have to cross roads to get between stations.
- **Food and refreshments:** Provided and budgeted for but there are opportunities for local businesses (Sobeys and Shoppers) to donate food
- **Ages:** We expect that most participants will be children and young teens, but it is encouraged that everyone who is interested participates!
- **Teams:** Teams of 4 is recommended
- **Attendance:** Expect around 300
- **Budget:** See page 17
- **Volunteers and Marketing:** See page 16
- **Trash/recycling:** Garbage and recycling bags will be set out and volunteers will collect the garbage and have it picked up from their black bins
- **Contingency Plan:** If the event day has bad weather, tents could be set up or the event could be rescheduled. It is also possible to move the event indoors to the Marshall Springs School, if allowed.
- **Additional funding:** Donations from local businesses

Application Q&A

Please describe the project or event. (What will you be doing? Who will be involved? Any additional partners?)

- An afternoon long “Evergreen Amazing Race”. Using different parks around the community as locations for challenges, puzzles, and activities.
- Parks around the community will be designated with a Country where the participants are given a task to complete. Upon completion, a passport (which is provided at the start) will be stamped and the next stage will be (randomly) given to the participant.
- Everyone can be involved:
 - The Amazing Race event itself
 - Checkpoint setups and supervising
 - Block party setup and cleanup
- Possible partners include the local Shoppers Drug Mart, Canadian Tire, and Tim Hortons.

How will this event encourage people to walk?

- By utilizing the numerous paths and parks around the community, the participants will have to walk, jog, or run to their next destination in order to complete the race.

How will this event encourage people to play?

- The participants will work together and complete the challenges together.
- At the end of the race there will be a block party held. There will be dinner, music, and games.

How will this event encourage people to be neighbourly?

- By hosting a community wide event, the members will get to know each other better. It’s a good chance for the newer members of the community to get to know the area better as well as create new contacts.

How do you plan to communicate your project or event to the community?

- Communication through the schools around the community as well as flyers posted at local stores, churches, and restaurants. They can also be mailed out.

Potential Expansion of the Idea

Our implementation suggestions are based on the limitations of the ActivateYYC budget and our knowledge of who would like to participate in this event. We have some recommendations for how you could make this Amazing Race even more amazing, if the resources are available.

1. Collaborate with the schools. See if students can help make crafts, displays or decorations to display at each continent, adding another component of creativity and fun.

2. Celebrate multiculturalism. This event is about going “around the world” which offers an opportunity for business owners or residents to showcase aspects of their own culture. Perhaps different local restaurants can donate food to showcase how multicultural Evergreen is.

3. Create tiers of difficulty. Right now, our proposed stations and clues are an equal level of difficulty for everyone. It would be worth exploring providing easy, medium and difficult tasks for people depending on their age.

4. Make it more competitive. We have designed this race so that it is not timed and there are no winners. The main goal is team building and completion of all the tasks. But you could certainly explore the idea of timing each team and providing prizes for the winners.





What's Next?

Getting involved with Activate YYC is easy! Here's what's next:

Step 1

Submit your ActivateYYC application and wait for the Federation of Calgary Communities to approve your grant.



Step 2

Start implementing the Amazing Race as outlined in this report. Get all the volunteers, permits, supplies, equipment, etc. Ensure you save all your receipts as proof of payment (How to Apply, 2017).



Step 3

Have fun at the Amazing Race! Take photos to document your project to prove you completed the project (Guidelines, 2017).

Step 4

Complete a brief online questionnaire about your project and submit your photos (How to Apply, 2017).

Step 5

Reimburse your project and collect your grant (How to Apply, 2017).





Conclusion

The Evergreen Amazing Race will give residents the opportunity to build a community atmosphere through cooperation and competition. Having the format be an around the world trip in the will also help spark conversation for those people who are new to the community from outside Canada, as the community is increasingly multicultural. This will get people involved, and allow them to get to know others in their community with a kind of atmosphere that can break down economic and cultural barriers. Being that the community is family oriented it will also help to keep both kids and adults involved, but also be open to people who may not have families. Lastly showcasing the path systems will help residents actively use this community asset more in the future, helping Evergreen residents walk, play and be neighborly during and beyond the Evergreen Amazing Race.





Amazing Race Activities

Activity ideas are based on supplies that the City of Calgary can provide through its Calgary Neighbourhoods Special Events Equipment inventory. See the following pages for the entire list of supplies provided. Some supplies are purchased and further materials could be acquired from the schools and other donors.

We suggest that at the beginning of the race, teams receive clues for all of the different stations (to avoid congestion at one station). From that point on, each station always gives the same clue (to keep things in order). For example, the volunteer at Antarctica should always distribute a clue for Africa.

Suggested order of stations: South America gives clues for North America. North America gives clues for Antarctica. Antarctica gives clues for Africa. Africa gives clues for Asia. Asia gives clues for Australia. Australia gives clues for Europe. This order of stations will make participants run around the community a few times, making the event longer and more challenging. If all 7 stamps have been completed, teams head to the finish line.

Station 1: Asia

Activity: Beach Ball Relay Race

Description: Have pairs face back to back and fit a beach ball between their backs. Link arms to keep the beach ball suspended between your backs and reach the finish line. If the beach ball drops, you have to start again! When the first pair of the team completes the task, the beach ball gets passed on to the next pair.

Materials needed: One beach ball per team, a mark for the start and finish line (acquired from the City of Calgary)

Asia Clue: Trek on over to this huge continent (the largest one on the globe)

Where you'll find pandas hanging out in their bamboo abode!

Next: Once the Asia activity is finished, a clue for Australia is given out.

Station 2: Antarctica

Activity: Chalk Pictionary

Description: Volunteer gives each group member a piece of paper with a word on it that the participant must draw out. The first participant draws the assigned object with chalk until the group guesses correctly. Each group member should draw one at a time, resulting in four drawings per team. When all four objects have been guessed correctly, the team is given a clue for the next station.

Materials needed: Separate pieces of paper with multiple different drawing assignments (best if Antarctica themed: Penguin, iceberg, igloo, seal, whale, sail-boat, south pole, polar bear, ocean, frost bite, icicles, snow etc) and chalk (chalk from the City of Calgary, paper with clues made by the volunteers)

Antarctica Clue: No people live here, and if you visit, you should probably bring a coat

Where you'll find penguins and seals while on your cruise boat!

Next: Once the Antarctica activity is finished, a clue for Africa is given out.

Station 3: North America

Activity: scavenger hunt for 5 plastic game balls hidden throughout the park.

Description: The team is given two words to begin their sentence. Multiple light blue balls are marked with a random word. These word balls are then scattered and hidden around the park. The team is tasked with locating enough balls to form a sentence. When a sentence is properly formed, the team is given a clue for their next station.

Materials needed: Plastic balls (purchased) and a sharpie to add a word to each game ball

Clue: Surrounded by the Atlantic, Arctic, and Pacific,

This place is where we live – it's really quite terrific!

Next: Once the North America activity is finished, a clue for Antarctica is given out.

Station 4: South America

Activity: Bean Bag Toss Race

Description: Have 4 hoops set out in a line, with each hoop gradually being placed further from the other. The objective of the game is to throw the bean bag accurately into the hoop in front in order to progress to the next hoop. Each person in the group must throw one bean bag. Once all hoops are filled the challenge is complete

Materials needed: Hoops and bean bags (from City of Calgary)

Clue: You'll find tropical plants and animals in the Amazon here,
You could even head up to Machu Picchu, if you do not fear!

Next: Once the South America activity is finished, a clue for North America is given out.

Station 5: Australia

Activity: Potato Sack Relay Race

Description: Group must hop from one end of the field to the next in potato sacks (relay race)

Materials needed: Potato sacks (from City of Calgary)

Clue: Head down under where kangaroos will be hopping everywhere,
And go to the endangered Great Barrier Reef, it's beautiful there!

Next: Once the Australia activity is finished, a clue for Europe is given out.

Station 6: Africa

Activity: Mummy Wrap

Description: One team member is wrapped with toilet paper by their teammates until they reach the "mummies" shoulders. Once the teammate is covered that challenge is complete.

Materials needed: Toilet paper (purchased)

Clue: Come hang out in the hot Savanna or swim in the Nile
And when you see the pyramids, you're bound to smile

Next: Once the Africa activity is finished, a clue for Asia is given out.

Station 7: Europe

Activity: Word Jumble – cut outs of letters spell a word (the word can vary based on age group). The group must solve the word puzzle to be able to go onto the next task. Tip: Words should have some sort of European connection (i.e. Eiffel Tower, Spaghetti, etc.)

Materials needed: Cardstock paper and a sharpie to write out letters for each word (purchased). We did not account for laminating fees, but that is possible for added resilience of the materials.

Clue: In this small continent, you will find a lot of castles
And as you eat a baguette, nothing will feel like a hassle

Next: Once the Europe activity is finished, a clue for South America is given out.
