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## Supporting Community for 65 years!

The earliest community associations formed in the 1920s to provide recreational programs to residents. Since then, these grassroots organizations have grown alongside Calgary communities to provide social, recreational and educational opportunities and a voice for community life. In 1961, 47 community associations came together to form the Federation of Calgary Communities to help these grassroots organizations present a unified voice for community, while also preserving their autonomy and enabling them to focus on local needs.

Today, we champion one of Canada's most unique volunteer models; the community association movement, with more than 159 member community associations and 130 non-profits across Calgary. We are 20,000 strong, making us one of the largest volunteer networks around!

Our members work hard to make a difference for Calgarians, shaping our city by working to support youth and families, seniors, sports and recreation, ethnocultural communities, safety, environment, urban planning, social services, the arts, and much more. Our network is diverse, and the Federation is here to support you in your dedication to improving neighbourhood life in Calgary!

The community association (CA) movement began in the 1890s with the Ratepayers Associations, which were advocates for municipal affairs. The first group incorporated under the Societies Act as a "community association" in 1930. CAs grew as "community clubs" and fierce advocates. They continued to incorporate as the city grew. By 1960, all Ratepayers associations rebranded as CAs.

In 1961, 47 CAs came together to form and officially incorporate the Federation of Calgary Communities. We were formed to unify the members' voices on community issues, development and community wellbeing. However, The City only provided funding to expand recreation and sport.

1976: The first three staff hired formed a company for the sole benefit of the President of the Federation.


1978: Minor Sport separated, and took the majority of our financial resources.


We continued to foster relationships between community associations and City Council and contributed our expertise to civic and provincial policy. Leaning in to this relationship, in 1984, Mayor Klein issued a proclamation declaring Community Association Membership week. As community association needs changed, we responded by expanding and diversifying our services. We grew our volunteer trainings and resources, hosted monthly learning sessions, provided education and a platform for community discussions.

We opened our membership to include other community-based non-profits. We continued to offer networking opportunities, volunteer training and resource-sharing to our members.

We partnered with The Calgary Foundation to help communities access different funding opportunities. We took on a leadership role in promoting inclusion. With new leadership in 2007, strategic direction and expanded programming, the end of the decade saw a huge resurgence in memberships.

During COVID, we acted as a communications hub and supported changes that continue to shape the volunteer sector. The Calgary Foundation funded our work to expand our financial literacy tools and support. We attained civic partner status with The City of Calgary, and took over Jane's Walk from The Calgary Foundation. The board set new strategic direction to enhance member value, improve workplace culture and diversify resources. We added two more grants, launched an Online Community Forum, and secured a large multi-year grant to launch an innovation lab and grant program to position Calgary as a placemaking hub. 2026 will see the launch of this extraordinary initiative.



# good places project

We created the Good Places Project with support from The City of Calgary. The program builds on the success of ActivateYYC, which helped launch over 180 community-led projects since 2017. We saw how small actions—like painting a mural or installing a bench—could bring neighbours together and change how people experience their city. Good Places expands that effort by providing a grant program, workshops, and capacity building opportunities to support community-led activation of public spaces.



Calgary's neighbourhoods are growing and changing. Good Places helps communities lead that change with opportunities to shape the public spaces that bring us together. Many communities have great ideas but need support to make them real. We created this project to give local groups the tools, funding, and confidence to improve the places they care about.


